Joy Browne, Ph.D., CNS-BC, IMH-E, is a Clinical Professor of Pediatrics and Psychiatry at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus-- School of Medicine. She is on the faculty of the Irving Harris Program for Child Development and Infant Mental Health. Dr. Browne holds dual licensure as a Pediatric Psychologist and a Clinical Nurse Specialist and has an Endorsement as an Infant Mental Health Mentor (IV) . She is on the faculty of JFK Partners University Center of Excellence in Developmental Disabilities, and Director of the Center for Family and Infant Interaction including the Colorado (NIDCAP) Center and the Family Infant Relationship Support Training (FIRST) programs, and the Fragile Infant Feeding Institute (FIFI). Dr. Browne's area of expertise is in neurobehavioral assessment and intervention with high-risk infants and their families, as well as systems change toward developmentally supportive and family centered care.



Diane Ballweg, MSN, RN, CCNS, RNC-NIC is currently the Clinical Nurse Specialist for newborn development at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. She has over 30 years of nursing experience in a variety of roles across obstetrics, pediatrics, and has worked over 20 years as a Neonatal Clinical Nurse Specialist. She is a veteran of the U.S. Air Force Nurse Corps and was appointed as the Consultant to the Air Force Surgeon General for Neonatal Nursing. Diane has been a NIDCAP professional since 1993. Her developmental care work includes: program development and leadership, education, mentoring, and the use of quality improvement strategies to translate NIDCAP research into clinical practice and system processes.



Linda Lacina, MSN, RN, is a NIDCAP Trainer, Infant Developmental Specialist, and Education Specialist at Cincinnati Children's Medical Center in Cincinnati, Ohio. A NICU nurse for 33 years, Linda specializes in training staff in infant neurodevelopmental support, facilitating parental attachment and bonding, and in the daily promotion of individualized developmentally supportive & cue based caregiving for infants in a Level 4 NICU. The NIDCAP Training and Research Center at Cincinnati Children's, founded in 2007, recently completed a research study about sleep organization in the preterm infant with feeding difficulties.
